Welcome to our Spring edition of Nexus Ink - and what a rollercoaster ride the disability sector has been on since I last put pen to paper. Following the election of a new Federal Government in May 2022, a real impact has been felt in the disability sector.

We have seen significant moves made by the Federal Government including adjusting the pricing model to acknowledge increased costs for providers, the creation of a jobs summit to look at addressing sector-wide staff shortages, and action on getting people with a disability out of hospital faster once they are medically ready to leave.

We have also seen a revamp of the NDIS Board with the appointment of Kurt Fearnley as Chair and the addition of new members Graeme Innes and Maryanne Diamond. The NDIS review has also been brought forward from 2023 to 2022.

Locally, the State government continues to play an important role in making Tasmania accessible, and I spoke recently with new Minister for Disability Services, Jo Palmer, about the direction of the sector. We anticipate a number of changes in Tasmania with the creation of a Disability Commissioner role and the Disability Services Act Review which will set new rules on issues such as restrictive practice. Minister for Community Services and Development, Nic Street, is also supporting a 'care workforce' plan and I am pleased to be on the steering committee for this project.

Meanwhile, Nexus has opened a new shared supported living house in Kingston. The purpose-built house allows for more independence than a traditional group home, and the flexible living arrangements include three, two-bedroom units and separate staff quarters for sleepover shifts.

We have split our Supported Independent Living Team in two, with Troy Briggs moving roles to support Manager Louise Sullivan. Troy's role will oversee a group of high support clients who often have both Autism and an intellectual disability. These clients require a significant amount of positive behaviour support to help keep staff and clients safe. These homes are intense workplaces that deserve an additional level of support and care.

We have also been busy talking to potential new staff and will continue to look for ways to attract and train new people as professional support workers.

Coming out of our winter hibernation it is great to see staff getting out into the community, supporting clients to experience the things they like to do. I'm looking forward to a busy and exciting end to the year.

Our brand-new Supported Independent Living (SIL) property in Kingston was officially opened in September and, as our cover photo shows, clients like Pania are very happy to be more independent in the new house but still have access to support as needed.

It was an exciting day for our Nexus Community with many high profile guests attending, including Federal Housing Minister Julie Collins MP who talked about her strong support the house.

A packed crowd of clients, families, key community members, local politicians and Nexus employees were there to celebrate this milestone occasion. Lucky guests enjoyed hot spiced apple juice and apple and apricot jam made from apples picked by some of our Customised Employment clients.

The new property provides a home for up to six people living with disability across its three two-bedroom units. It was built with client support in mind and clients are already benefiting from the special design that suits their needs.

We were very happy to work with Supported Affordable Accommodation Trust (SAA Trust) to build this house. It will help to ease some of the challenges faced by people living with disability looking for a home to suit their needs.

The SAA Trust attracts funds and builds the houses, then leases them out for 20 years to NDIS service providers such as Nexus.

The three units each have two bedrooms with their own ensuites, an open-plan kitchen, and a living and dining area. There is also a separate staff area in the house. The home has a Nexus vehicle on-site at all times, so that clients can be supported to go to appointments and activities in the community.

Our CEO Mark Jessop is keen to work with the SAA Trust again, and would like to see another SIL property in the far South of the state.

The SAA Trust got a \$6 million Federal Government grant under the Improving Social Housing Outcomes Program, which funded the Kingston house and eight other sites.



Ed was also thrilled to make a furry friend who seemed to share his love for coffee.



Rowbottom Day Support clients have also been beautifying the world around them, trying out activities including craft and painting.


A big thank you to Ed and Mark, who popped into the Nexus office to brighten our days with their artworks which are now hanging up in our offices.
